The W1NJM Saga

Thanks to Sis, WD8DIN, we now have chapter 31 of the W1NJM saga for your enjoyment.

Chapter 31 - World War II affects Geo.

Now, as a married man, I wanted to get back all the time that Hal Bubb owed me for the many times I had worked his shifts, and I presented him with my record of some hundreds of hours. He was greatly taken aback but promised to fulfill his obligations and started doing so by showing up in the middle of my shift and telling me I could go home. I went along with this for a time, then I told him that since I had worked for him at times he had requested, I wanted him to make time at my convenience, not his. He took this with little grace and said we'd do it his way or not at all. After all, he was my boss. He never did make up all the time he owed me, and the relations between us were strained after that -- for that and other reasons, I was out for a Sunday drive with Fritz Cowles, his girl Marge and Louise when the announcement came over the car radio that the Japanese had bombed Pearl Harbor.

I had never heard of Pearl Harbor. That evening Hal came to our house and told me not to come to work on the next evening because amateur radio was off the air "for the duration" – an expression that became increasingly common during the next couple of years. So the next morning I checked in at Mr. Handy's office at 38 La Salle Road and was told the FCC had granted W1AW special permission to continue operating but only for the purpose of contacting amateurs violating the close down order and for sending special bulletins pertaining to the League's efforts to have some of the public service work by amateurs continue.

So Hal and I spent the next few days to that end. It was surprising how many amateurs continued operating nonchalantly after war had been declared. When we contacted them, they seldom gave us an argument, though occasionally someone would declare he had special permission to continue operating for civil defense purposes.

Our bulletins continued on the normal schedule. Within two or three days all the amateur bands were practically deserted, but W1AW kept on operating well into January, until someone at HQ called the FCC and asked them how long they wanted us to continue operating. The person contacted in Washington expressed astonishment that we were still on the air and ordered us to cease operating at once.

Meanwhile, Hal Bubb had left to accept a job at Pratt & Whitney aircraft. I was "chief operator" at W1AW for a month, or a little over, until the station could be suitably "mothballed." W1AW remained shut up and silent for the duration. I went to work at La Salle Road doing clerical stuff, with the prospect of being out of work. I began to think it was time for me to "join up," as several of the HQ staff were doing, since there seemed little future for me at ARRL HQ. The 1940 Army Signal Corps offer of a commission was no longer available, although the Army was still conferring commissions on qualified civilians, in other categories.

Commissions in the Navy were being offered, however, and I forthwith made application, went to New York for an interview and was accepted pending a physical examination. Alas, my eyes failed to pass the test. My sympathetic examiner tried for a waiver but was turned down.

Commissions were available only for officers of the line, not for administrative officers. The former had to have 20-20 eyesight without glasses and mine were 20-30. I returned home greatly disheartened, feeling unwanted, except possibly as a buck private in the Army; I continued working at ARRL HQ as a clerk in the Communications Department under Ed Handy.

Ev Battey, Ed's right hand man, was a lieutenant in the naval reserve and he left the staff even before Pearl Harbor. Joe Moskey, W1JMY, took Ev's place as the assistant communications manager. Joe seemed puzzled that I didn't seem to mind, even though I was on the staff before he was. I said I thought Ed preferred him.

"Maybe so," Joe said, "but you had a legitimate claim and you should have stuck your oar in;" "I've been in the boondocks at W1AW," I said. "You've been right here and are much better qualified. You're the right man for the job."

"You'll never get anywhere," Joe admonished me, "if you don't assert yourself. You've been licensed longer than me, have had a lot more ham radio experience, and you're older. I can't figure out why you didn't say something. Don't you want to get ahead?" It wasn't the first time I had been criticized for lack of aggression. Ev Battey had made some kind remarks about me to Mr. Handy, which I had accidentally overheard, but Ed replied that I seemed to lack initiative and drive. I knew that Ed much preferred Joe and if I had protested Joe's promotion ahead of me I knew I would have been turned down. Should I have protested anyway? I knew I wouldn't have, even if I had not overheard Ed's remark about me. So maybe they were right. Maybe I did lack drive, but that was part of my make-up. It didn't make me feel any better, but there it was.

Joe left the staff shortly thereafter to take a job in the defense industry, which would give him a draft deferment. There was no one to promote over me so I assumed this time I was certain to back into the promotion. Instead, Ed made me "assistant to the communications manager" and my status remained that of low subordinate. Again I failed to protest and felt greatly humiliated instead of angry. I "took it lying down" and my self-respect took a nosedive.

But the worst was still to come. Ed Handy was also a naval reservist, a lieutenant commander, but his request for active duty was denied because of poor eyesight. In mid-1942, however, he received a visit from a major in the Army Directorate of Communications, who had been ordered to recruit him as a staff officer in the directorate with rank of major, equivalent to a Navy lieutenant commander. Ed had no Army experience but felt he had to accept if he wanted to serve in the armed forces during a time of war, and he was assured by the recruiting officer that they badly needed officers with his qualifications.

Coming in Chapter 32 - Increased war demands cause the League Communications Manager position to come open -- wait until you hear what happened.

I am elated that Jack, W5TFB, is back. His sagas of his past are most interesting. I look forward to reading more of them. I could use some tips from him about the Tesla coil he built. I have a large (8'x 8" diam) PE pipe wound with magnet wire that I started some time ago, but left unfinished, that a few tips might get me inspired enough to finish it.

I fell out when I read about his running into a room full of HRO's at a government installation. The HRO has always been my "dream" receiver. It was the only receiver that I ever heard the ringing associated with a crystal filter.

I would like to try to take on a little more obligation in connection with the net. What would be the most helpful for you and Rodney? Perhaps, since I do the Friday TEX/2, it would be efficient to also do the TEX/1.

Please send an explanation of how RN5 operates. I was looking at the current TEX weekly schedule and it appears that I could better serve if I could take the RN5 slots, both RN5/1 and RN5/2 on Fridays in addition to TEX/1 and TEX/2.

As you will see in the duty roster, I took Jay up on his offer. He is now the NCS for both early and late Friday nets. Additionally, he is primary on the early RN5 liaison on Friday and backup for the late RN5 liaison. Many thanks, Jay!

Tom, NK5Z, is the happy owner of a new Vibroplex Blue Racer bug. Notice how his sending has improved in the last few days? Tom was a little unhappy with how fast the bug made the dots, so when Vibroplex informed him there were no additional weights available, Tom used a little "ham ingenuity". The picture shows how he solved the problem with a bit of solder.

Ken, K5RG, checked out his "backup" FT-1000D on TEX one night. I noticed the keying did not sound like Ken's normal self, so I told



him about it. He wrote: "Well I was greatly impressed that you could hear what I have known for years regarding my FT-1000D. When I used it extensively, I had the external keyer set up with a key compensation (an extension of the keying inputs) set at 3 mSec. This is just about the same as increasing the keying weight but the key compensation is independent of the keyer speed. The FT-1000D in the full break in mode chops the characters just a little such that it sounds like the weight is soft. I was using the internal keyer tonight since the external MFJ keyer is hooked to the ICOM. I had also brought out the old Vibroplex lambic paddle which I stopped using when the XYL got me a K8RA lambic paddle which I liked much better since the slightly wider distance between the two paddles greatly improves my keying.

I had the FT-1000D serviced (realigned and the SWR diodes replaced which was the cause of the auto tuner malfunctions if you remember a few years ago). We installed some W8JI mods that seemed to be accepted by the Yaesu crowd. So having spent some money on the 'old' rig, I felt I needed to try it out on CW having made a number of phone contacts with it earlier (just needed to wire up the paddle).

The plan is to have it as a back-up rig and maybe use it for HF packet - we'll see."

In response to my answer to him, Ken elaborated further on keying, lambic modes, and keys, which will be of interest to those of you struggling with lambic mode:

I use the K8RA paddle in the lambic mode but I would suspect that I actuate it as a dot-dash mechanism. I don't believe I make any attempt to hold both paddles down to get more characters sent. The MFJ-495 external keyer is in the lambic B mode whatever that means. Think I tried to understand it many years ago, could hear no difference and left it in the B mode. OK, I just pulled out the manual and what I've been saying is that I never squeeze both paddles at the same time. I guess this in essence disallows any 'iambic' operation. The difference between mode A and B is how the keyer responds to having both paddles squeezed at the same time and then released. Since I never do that, one will never hear any difference between mode A and B (which I believe has become somewhat a standard amongst keyers).

My history is that like you, I went thru the bug era and then progressed to a Brown Brothers paddle, then a Vibroplex Presentation and now a K8RA brass paddle. As I said before, I like the wide paddle spacing on the K8RA as compared to the Vibroplex. I am not a finesse paddle type but one that likes a lot of motion in the hand/fingers. Not having much ability to copy in my head, I actually switched from my right hand to my left hand so I could copy messages with my right and send with my left. I hated the code back in the days when I was trying to get my first license. The code kept me from a license for over 4 years until finally the Boy Scouts merit badge forced the issue. Six years later when I was getting tired of name, station and weather reports on phone, the CW traffic bug bit me.

TEX Net Topics

Statistics:

Check-ins were about the same as last month, but traffic count was way down again. Tom, NK5Z, maintained his 1st place position with 49 (79%). Rodney, W5DY, with 34 (55%) came in 2nd. Sam, W5CU edged out Mike, W5TMO for 3rd with 26 (42%). Thanks to all who checked in for your support.

Visitors included Mike, KA5NNG, from AR, K6CD/5 (who is active on RN6 in CA and was just visiting), Larry, KC0M from MO, Eric, KE5PWL from LA, Richard, W3TWD from MS, and Brad, KM5WN, also from MS.

The complete list of stations and traffic / liaison totals are shown in the following table. Traffic averaged 1.3 per net session (down from 1.6 last month). That number is the lowest in memory for any month. Poor conditions had something to do with it, but there just wasn't much coming in from RN5 again. Net time averaged 11.8 minutes per session (compared to 12.2 last month). Check-ins averaged 5.1 per session (up from 4.9 last month).
