Excerpt from Jack, W5TFB's Book

Here is the next excerpt from Jack's book. Jack prepares to run a chess tournament and does some more fancy cooking. Also more anecdotes about life in Louisiana.

Mae came in. She looked exhausted. I asked, "All night?" "Almost. I went to bed around 3, but I finished the pointless busywork." I started the toast. The toaster had a sensitive uncalibrated

temperature control. I finally got it set for whole wheat bread. I had not remembered to set out the butter but did now. Mae was sipping her OJ. She asked if there was any coffee, and I poured her a cup and warmed it. "Cream?" She said no, black. I nodded my approval and brought it with her toast.

"Tell me more about the chess tournament. How do they decide who wins what? How do they decide who plays whom? I don't remember your telling me: How many games do you lose to be eliminated?"

"There is a complicated but well-defined algorithm to answer the first two questions. It is implemented in a computer program I helped write. No one is eliminated, but you can withdraw at any time. The main purpose of the pairing is to see to it that in each round after the first you play someone as close to your playing strength as possible. For example, if you win your first game then you will play someone in the second round that has also won his/her first game, or perhaps has drawn, rarely lost. The assignment of colors is random in the first round, and after that is arranged so that no player has White or Black more than three times or fewer than two. This is the rule that is always followed for players who do not withdraw.

"Wins count 1 point, draws 1 point, and a loss 0 points. For example, at the start of the third round, players with two draws are grouped with players with one win and one loss. The computer takes care of everything, even assigning which board your next game is played at. The boards are numbered. Boards with the lower numbers generally have the better players.

"The prizes are trophies. In this tournament any player who gets a score of 3 points (of 5) will receive one. As you probably would guess, the prizes are worthless, sort of like a soccer or bowling trophy, having value only to the person who earns one. Most people who play do so for fun, not for the plastic. OK, sometimes a marble base and a metal placard to engrave what position the trophy represents and the player's name.

"Based on limited experience playing you and Sue I think you will win 3 or 4 points. You will probably not win 5, for there is a master, Craig Cain, playing. He is not invincible but is good and should beat you. He has beaten me twice in tournaments but a 14-year-old drew Cain, who was and is 16, in a simultaneous demonstration. Cain finished 21-1-0, meaning he won 21 and drew 1, with no loss."

Noting the time, Mae said she had to go. She thanked me for breakfast and kissed me on the cheek. I think I blushed.

Sue came down just in time to see Mae pedal away. Her hair was damp, so she had showered. That seemed like a plan, but I wanted to do laundry first. I needed to buy decent clothes for the tournament. At least buy something with no holes. I asked Sue what she would have for breakfast. She said I know. (I did not!) Then she said a cup of coffee and some toast, maybe with scrambled eggs. I told her to tell me 40 minutes before she wanted the eggs. She said, "OK, I want them."

I put butter in a shallow skillet, got out four eggs and the cream, found dried tarragon.

She gave me a hug and nibbled my earlobe, making me tingle. Maybe this was the solution to a problem I had pondered for almost all my life: what are earlobes for? I had a puppy who nibbled on it but that doesn't count. He nibbled everything.

"Mae's bedroom has a door to an adjoining room too, like mine. She used to use the other room as a place to study. Now she mostly uses the library. She used to have friends overnight but hasn't since the seventh grade. I don't know why. In the sixth grade she had a six girl slumber party."

I said, "I need to do laundry and go shopping for some decent clothes."

"Unless you want to go to Lafayette, there is only one store. It is good but expensive. It is run by a couple. He used to be mayor and she is a retired seamstress, her eyesight now not up to it as a steady task. She really does all the work. They have four employees in all, counting a buyer/accountant. Most of my clothes were bought there. They don't advertise and don't need to."

The butter had melted, and I gently poured the lightly beaten egg-cream-tarragon mixture in. I had already put a heat disperser under the skillet, and lowered the heat. The idea is to cook slowly so that the egg morsels are firm but moist, and all about the same size, a half teaspoon or so. It requires constant attention, although I could talk and do it at the same time.

Patience helps. I was used to a small cast iron skillet, but this one would do. It was stainless steel joined to a heavy aluminum bottom, probably better.

"Would you like company shopping? We could take the Z and I could treat you to lunch at a homey Cajun place."

"I would love that." (I was not sure about the shopping. Most women drive me crazy when I try to shop with them. Agnes was the only exception. She has this view that you should know exactly what you want and minimize the time spent in a store. I can't remember ever going shopping with her.)

Sue was beside me, watching. I was using a chopstick and teaspoon to make the eggs behave. They were cooking too fast so I turned the heat way down. A little won't do it. I asked, "Who set the minimum adjustment? It is just perfect."

"I did. I had to borrow a narrow screwdriver. Our computer guru has an incredible selection. Since we went to all Macs and the Sun server running Unix we have had no problems. He comes in Sunday morning at 1 to perform an incremental backup on every computer over the network and do a full scan for junk. I don't really know what he does. Everything just works. He and his son are partners in his consulting business. The son configured the Sun firewall. We have never had one problem since we changed to the Sun and Apple hardware, and Unix."

The eggs were almost done, so I turned off the fire and asked if she wanted toast. She did, but just half a slice, so I turned to that and got out plates to serve her. That done I went to put laundry in and showered. The laundry would take an hour or so, but the store probably opened at 10. If there was anything I liked at the clothing store I could wear it for lunch, although a homey Cajun place would probably not have a dress code.

When I came down from the shower she complimented me on the scrambled eggs. I had to admit that most cooks in a rush would not have 40 minutes to prepare that dish, and said a 5 minute job using a spatula will have the same nutritional value.

Sue said, "But you of all know that the value of food does not begin when it reaches your tummy." I just nodded.

There was a long silence. Up until now that meant that one of us was in a huddle with himself, and since it wasn't me, I asked, "What?"

I am sure she wanted to say more, and I certainly did, but I kissed her and gave her a hug, and said I needed to put the wash in the dryer. She told me I could wear the clothes I was wearing earlier today, that it wasn't a fancy store, just ordinary people.

"So they don't have a floorwalker in a tux?" She giggled, "No, not even one in overalls with a straw hat." I told her I would take the wash out of the machine and leave it in the basket and we could go. She said, "I'll fetch the Z. It needs to go around more often than it does." I dressed and checked my stash. I had a little over \$500. When you drive a 15 year old car that has been wrecked, held together with duct tape and bailing wire, you need some cash. The wash had finished and I noticed someone else had taken it out and put it in my (really Sue's) basket. Both machines and the dryer were going. She had her car waiting for me. I climbed in. I never liked the 240-Z. The seats were too low and the engine noise was excessive and raspy sounding while accelerating. For two years I owned a Toyota Celica which I loved. It did everything right, got 40 mpg, 45 highway, with me driving, handled better than the Z, and was fun to drive. It was totaled in Midland while parked. I was visiting the woman I used to dance with whose husband had fallen off a mountain. I wasn't expecting anything, just wanted her to know I care.

She had a beautiful daughter named Amber that had red hair like her father. Sue drove like the Russians were on the freeway chasing her. When we got to the store she looked at me and asked if I was OK. I didn't exactly rush from the car and kiss the ground, but I had to fight it off. I told her I know she can drive but must have learned how in Germany. She confirmed that, but gave me a look. There the first rule is, 'A miss is as good as a kilometer.' The rest are extreme. For example, 'If you can see the headlights of the vehicle behind you then you are going too slow. Increase your speed.'

I liked the store. The owner recognized Sue, came over and asked if she could help us. I told her what I wanted, three days worth of sturdy respectable but not fancy clothes, and about what I wanted to spend. All must be mostly cotton and washable in a machine using water. I told her I strongly preferred blue and a light rose color with no pattern. And I told her what size I thought I was. I came out with three cotton-polyester blend pants and six shirts, and also six pairs of socks, all together within my budget. I wore navy blue pants and a short sleeved light rose casual shirt, and new shoes. The shoes brought me over budget but the ones I was wearing were really ratty looking, just not so noticeable with old clothes. Sue lent me the difference.

We got to the Cajun restaurant, more like a diner/beer-joint with a dance floor. There was a small stage with an upright piano, chairs, and drums but no players. We were the only

customers in sight, but it was just noon. The bartender yelled through a window, probably to the kitchen, "Sue's ici." A man came out of a swinging door and greeted us in French. Sue returned the greeting, and (I think) asked what he had for today. He told her, I had no idea precisely what, but it was about cooking. It took him a while to say.

She led me to a table and translated. "They have fresh roast leg of venison that has marinated two days, but it won't be ready for another 30 minutes, and will be better in an hour. We could go for a walk. The cook is Bill Sevier, and it will be worth the wait. I'm sorry about the French but he can't, or won't, speak English. The deer was taken two weeks ago and butchered immediately, and has been hanging in his locker. I used to obtain all my meat here, but I just don't eat meat as much as I used to. There is so much from the garden, and people bring me meat when they have extra, I guess because I give away so much from the garden."

"Can we get water now? I'm thirsty. There is something in that store's air that may have caused it. Yes, a walk would be good."

She told the barkeep we would have water and be back in an hour. Outside, she said, "The docks are a little more than a mile from here. Would that be a good walk?"

I said, "There are only good walks. Let's go."

Sue is still good to walk with. She sets a pace that is just right for a talking walk, only no one was talking. After about two blocks she asked, "Do you remember what I told you the last time we were together?"

"How could I forget? I said, 'You what?' which was not a nice reply and probably hurt your feelings. I had no idea what 'I love you' meant."

"That is what my grandmother said. I was crying, and she asked me why and I told her. It surprised me that I could tell anyone, but I felt so all alone. We talked about it for a while, and she explained that boys my age mature more slowly than girls, probably because of the way the society of the past hundred thousand years developed. A girl my age would probably be pregnant or have a child, and those feelings hold everything together, especially the mother and helpless child. The father would be much older. And that same girl would die before she was 35."

I knew that was not true in all the details. Even as short a time as two thousand years ago girls were not sexually mature until they were at least 17. I said nothing.

She continued, "If it had not been for that long talk I think I would have died. I wanted to, but she told me how I could forgive you and that I must live, for surely you would find me."

I didn't pick on her about her pronouns. "It is true that I looked, but you were not found. I didn't find you now, I just happened to notice a lot of you in Mae and asked her what her grandmother's maiden name was. She told me, and here we are. I did have a little more data. I knew it was your 70th birthday and you had a sister a year younger who was giving you a party. Mae told me."

"But we have a lot of catching up to do. I haven't told you anything except sketchy things about business which I'm sure you do not care about." "It isn't that I don't care. There are other things that I would rather hear about, but that I certainly would not ask." "Why not?"

"Fear. My respect for your privacy. That it might lead to my telling you something which would make you send me away, or, worse, want to but not do it. The trouble with a past is there is so much of it. I can't tell everything because most of it I don't understand or remember. Why don't you ask more?" That was a sleazy trick I was sorry for as soon as I said it. "I said that wrong. You will ask when you ask, and tell when you tell. If ever."

"Yes, and my 'Why not?' was thoughtless as well." "It wasn't offensive. Mine was." I could smell the bayou. I liked that word, which came to us via Louisiana French, from Choctaw bayuk meaning 'small river forming part of delta.' It wasn't bad, but we are not all that close to the original. We were going down a gentle grade. I asked, "Is that an icehouse? Do you remember the one in Wichita Falls on Scott street?"

"Yes to both. This one still makes and stores hundred pound slabs of ice but doesn't deliver any more. Most of it is coarsely crushed and sold to shrimpers."

"I remember walking to it (at the corner of Scott and Ohio) one Saturday afternoon with you. It was a hot September day and they gave us paper cups full of crushed ice."

"I had forgotten. That was a nice day. By the time we got to the library we were out of ice, so we went inside. It was always cool there. You could not stay because you had to get back to work."

"The docks are just around this bend. It is fun to be here at dawn. Now there will be a few idle shrimp boats, but early the place is bustling. The shrimpers actually catch crayfish here. The shrimp are south where the water is saltier. They can live in this water but not breed."

"We called them 'crawdads' when I was a kid. You could catch them with bacon on a string."

She nodded, and said, "A lot of people call them crawfish here." We sat on a rail beside one of the docks. She asked, "Shall we go back?" So we did. I asked, "How does Bill make any money? There was no one there at noon." She said, "It is packed at night. The people who go there work during the day. Bill also sells most of his stuff to restaurants. He delivers in the afternoon, sometimes cooked food as well. He has a large smokehouse at his home. He is probably the best butcher in Louisiana, certainly the best I have heard of. His sausage is heavenly but I seem unable to digest as much as I can eat. He also has a separate bakery with a huge wood-fired oven."

"I have never tasted leg of venison." "Did Bill say what the marinade was, and the sauce?" "Only in a general way. When he talks about food and cooking he assumes that everyone knows everything. For example, he will list what's in it but not how much. He never shares a recipe either. Many people do not know how to taste, although I don't know any."

"Sadly, I do." I decided to press just a little. "Can you remember any of the elements of the marinade?"

"I may not have them all right. He takes no prisoners when speaking French. Let's see: white wine, vinegar, olive oil, carrot, onion, celery, parsley, whole cloves and peppercorns. I think that is all. It is for a 3 kilogram leg. Soak for 2 days at 10° C.", "50° F. The inside door of my icebox is 45°.

"To serve, carve venison and place slices on a warmed serving plate and spoon sauce over. Pass remaining sauce with the meat."

"That sounds good, but expensive. I guess you can reuse the marinade."

"Oh, I forgot to tell you. I never pay for anything at Bill's. He drops by my garden when he needs fresh herbs and vegetables, and when the sweet corn is ripe he gets all he can use. He has a large grill."

We were nearly there. It smelled good outside, and I was hungry. Our table was set with fresh water and basket of French bread, made that morning. "I suppose Bill is a baker as well?"

"Yes, that is another thing, but most restaurants can't afford what he charges. Anyone can make French bread. Oh, by the way, he is from Belgium, not France."

Bill brought the platter out, and the hot sauce. He said (I learned soon) that he couldn't stay, he needed to make deliveries. Sue said that he usually sits with her while she eats. She said, "He tells me he likes my accent, and that my French is perfect, but I know better."

We started eating. We didn't have a lot, looked like half a pound or so in all. I have never had such tender venison. The sauce was good. I do not want to shock anyone, but it was perfect for dipping torn-off ends of the bread. We finished everything, took our dishes to the kitchen, and I washed them, giving the final rinse in the sterile sink. Sue dried them and put them up.

The barkeep had already wiped off the table, so we were finished. I left a couple of dollar bills on the bar. There was a couple at the other end of the bar having beer. It was almost 1430 when we got back, so I took the bag of clothes we bought and went to dry the wash. The dryer was not in use. Back in the house I hung up the clothes. The closet did not look so sadly empty now.

I decided I would go for another walk. I had not seen the orchard. Most of the trees are dormant. Sue might enjoy showing me around. I needed more data.

I reached the orchard. The first thing I noticed was the heavy mulch, and the complete absence of weeds. I knew that they did not use chemicals to control weeds. Another was the size. It was much bigger than I thought. The trees were not clumped, but were spread out randomly except for plum and peach trees that have to be together so they will pollinate. The result was that it felt like a natural forest. There were teak benches scattered around. I sat on one and found it to be comfortable, a good place to read or daydream. Still, it was clearly a working orchard

I headed back to the house. It was at least ten degrees cooler in the woods, about the same as the inside of the house. Of course it was a cool day. Sue kept the house between 69° and 79°. In the office they controlled between 72° and 76°. That was all done automatically, with individual controls for each room regulated in the house by the library computer and in the office by the Sun. It probably had trouble with swing seasons, especially in the office. I

stopped by the laundry to pick up the dried clothes. Those quarters had analog controls, but with sensors to turn everything off when the area was not occupied except to keep the relative humidity below 50%.

Sue was in the front room reading. I noticed what it was. Sue didn't seem to care if I knew. I had enough sense to say nothing. Cute comments are rarely a good idea.

I went upstairs, unlocked my side of the closet door, undressed, and fell down on the big bed, too much for one day. I had to be in Lafayette before dusk, and earlier would be better. I needed to talk to Sue and Mae soon. I was pooped, just everything. I set my little timer for 99 minutes 99 seconds (the maximum) and crashed. I may have slept, but Sue had entered from her side. I looked at the time. It was almost 3. I turned off the alarm...
